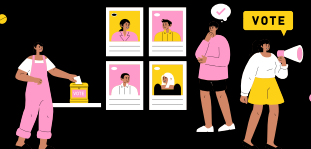


VOTING WHEN YOU'RE UNHOUSED OR DON'T HAVE A FIXED ADDRESS



**2025 Federal Elections
Voting Guide!**

Whether you're voting or helping someone else vote, this guide covers what you need to know, what to ask for, and how to make sure eligible voters can vote.

- Election Day is on April 28th, from 9 AM - 9 PM EST.
- Advance voting days are on April 18th, 19th, 20th, and 21st, from 9 AM to 9 PM EST.

WHAT IS MY VOTING ADDRESS IF I DON'T HAVE HOUSING?

Your address is wherever you access services, have a meal or stay regularly. It could be a shelter, food bank, or a drop-in centre. That place can serve as your voting address.

DO I NEED IDENTIFICATION TO VOTE?

Yes, but you have options. Canada's voting laws recognize that proof of identity and address can look different for everyone. If you are 18 and a Canadian citizen, you can vote. You will need to show:

- Your name.
- Your address (this can be a letter of confirmation of residence from a shelter, food bank, soup kitchen, or community organization you use).
- Any ID with your name (even if expired!).
- Or, bring someone from your neighbourhood who can vouch for you.

WHERE CAN I FIND THE LETTER OF CONFIRMATION OF RESIDENCE?

Staff at the shelter, food bank, or community organization you use regularly can help you get this letter. Ask if they can provide it on official letterhead or download the Elections Canada template. You can also ask a staff to scan the QR code on the right to get the letter, or go to: tinyurl.com/y444u2mb →

WHAT DO I DO WITH THE LETTER?

If you have a Letter of Confirmation of Residence, just pair it with any ID that has your name and go to your polling station to vote. If you're not sure where to vote, a staff member at the shelter, food bank, or community organization you use can help, or ask them to scan the QR code on the right. They will just need the postal code of where you stay or eat the most to look it up. →

WHAT IF I DON'T HAVE ANY IDENTIFICATION AT ALL?

You can still vote.

- You must go to the same polling place as the person vouching for you.
- That person must bring ID that shows proof of their address and identity to vote.
- You'll both need to sign a form confirming the information that they are vouching for you.
- They can only vouch for one person.
